Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

When making decisions about using Pupil Premium funding it is important to consider the context of the school and the subsequent challenges faced. Research conducted by EEF should then be used to support decisions around the usefulness of different strategies and their value for money.

Common barriers to learning for disadvantaged children can be less support at home, weak language and communication skills, lack of confidence, more frequent behaviour difficulties and attendance and punctuality issues. There may also be complex family situations that prevent children from flourishing. The challenges are varied and there is no "one size fits all".

Our ultimate objectives are:

- ✓ To narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils.
- ✓ For all disadvantaged pupils in school to make or exceed nationally expected progress rates.
- ✓ To support our children's health and wellbeing to enable them to access learning at an appropriate level.

We aim to do this through

- Ensuring that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all the pupils
- Ensuring that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed
- When making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.
- Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time.

Achieving these objectives:

The range of provision the Governors consider making for this group include and would not be inclusive of:

- Ensuring all teaching is good or better thus ensuring that the quality of teaching experienced by all children is improved.
- To allocate a 'Catch Up' Enhanced Teaching Assistant to each Year Group providing small group work focussed on overcoming gaps in learning
- 1-1 support
- Additional teaching and learning opportunities provided through experienced teachers or TAs and external agencies such as SALT and LSS.
- All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress, moving children to at least age-related expectations.
- Pupil premium resources are to be used to target able children on Free School Meals to achieve Age Related Expectations
- Additional learning support.
- Support payment for activities, educational visits and residentials. Ensuring children have first-hand experiences to use in their learning in the classroom.

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

Early Years Foundation Stage

- Communication and Language % of disadvantaged achieving the ELG nationally was 68.2% and school disadvantaged was 69.2%
- Literacy % of disadvantaged achieving the ELG nationally was 23.1% and school disadvantaged was 69.2%
- Maths % of disadvantaged achieving the ELG nationally was 62.8% and school disadvantaged was 76.9%.

Year 1 Phonics Check

 68.2% disadvantaged nationally passed the Phonics check. 53.9% disadvantaged in school passed the Phonics check.

Key Stage 1

- **Reading-** 58% EXP disadvantaged nationally and disadvantaged school 30.8%.
- Writing- 47.9% EXP disadvantaged nationally and 7.7% EXP disadvantaged school
- Maths- 58.8% EXP disadvantaged nationally and 0% EXP disadvantaged school .

Key Stage 2

- Reading- 62.8%EXP disadvantaged nationally and 75% EXP disadvantaged school
- Writing-58.8% EXP disadvantaged nationally and 58.3% EXP disadvantaged school
- Maths-59.4% EXP disadvantaged nationally and 91.7% EXP disadvantaged school.
